




<u>Transitional Kindergarten</u>

Super Kids

This week we will have our spelling test this Wednesday, 10/11. We are continuing our <u>Super Kids Hit Second Grade</u> Book and are working in unit 2. We are also continuing our first book club. We will learn about adjectives. We will continue personal narratives.

This week, we will be practicing place value using base-ten blocks, expanded, and standard forms of numbers. We will practice adding and subtracting using base-ten blocks.

3rd Grade

ELA

We are in Unit 2 (Animal Classification). We will continue to be animal researchers and observe, describe, and record animal characteristics. We are identifying parts of speech (nouns, verbs, adjectives). We will let students know what day our spelling test will be, so check planners.

Math

Last week we added and subtracted larger numbers. This week, we will apply these skills to real life situations with a pretend bakery activity.

Social Studies

We are studying human capital and human resources.

Science

Students will continue with lesson 2.3 Students deepen their understanding of magnetic force by finding that a magnet can attract or repel another magnet, but can only attract and not repel the metal objects moved by magnetic force.

4th Grade

ELA

Social Studies

We began a unit on the Midwest states and capitals.

Math

Last week, we used bar models to find equivalent fractions. This week, we will compare fractions and apply our knowledge to real life situations with a pretend garden activity.

Students will focus on figurative language and using context clues as they work through the beginning of the novel.


8th Grade Unit 1: "The Art of Suspense"

K-5 Art

Kindergarten: KL students will be starting a Line Design Project, where we will explore different kinds of lines, draw a variety on paper and add color using paint sticks!

1st Grade: Students in 1T will continue working on a Line Turtle Project. We will learn to draw turtles, then filled their shells with different lines and patterns! Students will color and cut out their turtles. 2nd Grade: Students in 2M will continue working on a painting project inspired by artist Friedensreich Hunderwasser, born in Austria in 1928. We will draw organic trees in crayon, and will focus on painting using watercolor paint.

5th grade: Students do not have art for this quarter rotation.













The Spanish culture in Latin America is full of rich traditions, festive holidays, and tantalizing superstitions. **Colombia**-Festivals of the flowers, **Argentina**-Grape Harvest Festival, **Spain**-Las Falles, **All Countries**-La Semana Santa, **Chile**-Fiesta de la Tirana and **Mexico**-The Day of the Dead among others.

La cultura española en América Latina está llena de ricas tradiciones, fiestas festivas y supersticiones tentadoras. **Colombia**-Fiestas de las flores, **Argentina**-Fiesta de la Vendimia, **España**-Las **Falles, Todos los Países**-La Semana Santa, **Chile**-Fiesta de la Tirana y **México**-El Día de los Muertos **entre** otros.







The Day of the Dead, a traditional holiday, is typically commemorated on November 1 and 2, although local variations may include dates like October 31 or November 6. This observance is most prominent in Mexico, where it has deep historical roots, but it's also celebrated in other regions, particularly among individuals of Mexican descendants. As part of their research on Hispanic traditions during Hispanic Heritage Month, Mrs. Babcock's Spanish class made decorations and crafted a model of an altar to pay tribute to the departed.

El Día de los Muertos es una festividad tradicionalmente celebrada el 1 y 2 de noviembre, aunque en algunas localidades pueden incluirse otras fechas, como el 31 de octubre o el 6 de noviembre. Esta festividad es ampliamente observada en México, donde se desarrolló en gran medida, y también se celebra en otros lugares, especialmente entre personas de descendencia mexicana. Como parte de su investigación sobre las tradiciones hispanas durante el Mes de la Herencia Hispana, la clase de español de la Sra. Babcock hicieron decoraciones y crearon un modelo de un altar en honor a los difuntos.

School Social Work Services

RELATED SERVICES:

- Working with those problems in a child's living situation that affect the child
- Participating in special education assessment meetings as well as individual Educational Planning Meetings's adjust
- Mobilizing family, school, and community resources to enable the child to learn as effectively as possible in his or her educational program
- Assisting in devment in school. (home, school, and community)
- Preparing a social or developmental history on a child with a disability.
- Counseling (group, individual and/or family)eloping positive behavioral intervention strategies.

SERVICES TO STUDENTS:

- Providing crisis intervention.
- Developing intervention strategies to increase academic success.
- Assisting with conflict resolution and anger management.
- Helping the child develop appropriate social interaction skills.
 - Assisting the child in understanding and accepting self and others.

SERVICES TO PARENT/FAMILIES:

- Working with parents to facilitate their support in their children's school adjustment.
- Alleviating family stress to enable the child to function more effectively in school &community.
- Assisting parents to access programs available to students with special needs.
- Assisting parents in accessing and utilizing school and community resources.

SERVICES TO SCHOOL PERSONNEL:

- Providing staff with essential information to better understand factors (cultural, societal, economic, familial, health, etc.) affecting a student's performance and behavior.
- Assessing students with mental health concerns.
- Developing staff in-service training programs.
- Assisting teachers with behavior management.
- Providing direct support to staff.

SCHOOL-COMMUNITY LIAISON:

- Obtaining and coordinating community resources to meet students' needs.
- Helping school districts receive adequate support from social and mental health agencies.
- Advocating for new and improved community/school service to meet the needs of students and families.
- Helping the system respond effectively to each child's needs.

SERVICES TO DISTRICTS:

- Assist in developing and implementing educational programs for children for exceptional children.
- Developing alternative programs for students with attendance concerns or involvement with the law.
- Identifying and reporting child abuse and neglect.
- Providing consultation regarding school law and school policy including IDEA and Section 504.
- Providing case management for students and families requiring multiple resources.







Cell Phone / Smart Watch Policy

Student cell phones/smart watches should be turned off and out of sight during the regular school day from 8:30-3:13. This means that a student may carry a phone/smart watch during the school day, but it should not be seen by staff or other students. However, I strongly encourage students to leave their cell phones/smart watches in their locker and or backpack. Please see the cell phone/smart watch expectations/procedures listed below.

Cell Phone/Smart Watch Violation 1:

A student has their cell phone/smart watch visible and/or it is in use. A staff member will confiscate the phone/watch and turn it into the front office. The student will report to the front office at the end of the day to get their phone/watch.

Guardian(s) will be called and informed of the cell phone/smart watch violation.

• Cell Phone/ Smart Watch Violation 2:

A student has their cell phone/smart watch visible and/or it is in use. A staff member will confiscate the phone/watch and turn it into the front office. Guardian(s) will be called and informed of the cell phone/smart watch violation. Cell phone/Smart Watch will remain in the front office until it is picked up by the Guardian(s). The cell phone/smart watch will not go home with the student.

• Cell Phone/Smart Watch Violation 3:

A student has their cell phone/smart watch visible and/or it is in use. A staff member will confiscate the phone and turn it into the front office. Guardian(s) will be called and informed of the cell phone violation. Cell phone/smart watch will remain in the front office until it is picked up by the Guardian(s). The cell phone/smart watch will not go home with the student. Administration will work with the student and guardian to create an individualized plan regarding the cell phone/smart watch being present in school.

Dear Willow Families,

We hope everyone enjoyed the long weekend. We are writing to ask for your support to help ALL of our students start their day physically safe, emotionally safe, satisfied from breakfast, and ready to learn.

Please remember that students should be getting 9-12 hours of sleep each night. Sleep is the best way to come prepared to learn. Also, as a reminder, breakfast is free this year for all students. Breakfast is served until 8:20 a.m. each morning. That being said, we have noticed that many students are not boarding the Early Bus in order to eat breakfast at school. Instead, they are staying at the playground or basketball court to remain with their friends unsupervised. Please tell your student(s) to get on the Early Bus to eat breakfast. We cannot think on empty stomachs.

Over the past couple weeks, the Willow Springs School Administration has been made aware of incidents taking place at the playground or basketball court involving different ages of students who attend Willow. Some students are at those locations earlier than necessary or refusing to board the Early Bus in order to remain at the stop with their friends. During this time, the students are unsupervised and they may be more likely to make choices that could result in negative consequences. There are no Willow Staff Members at the bus stops. Although we respect the busy schedules of our families, we feel that it is important to send a reminder that sometimes students need the help of adults to make positive choices. If you are able to be with your student(s) at the bus stop, to support their behaviors, and send them on the bus supervised, we anticipate it would decrease the number of incidents occurring before school and help facilitate a positive start to the school day.

We also ask that guardians review the following bus expectations with your student(s).

Bus Expectations with your student(s) at home:

- Students should wait until the bus comes to a full and complete stop before approaching to board.
- Students should use kind language towards their classmates and driver
- Students should keep their food in their backpacks
- Students should keep their body parts inside the bus at all times and remain seated on their bottom.

Since there are no Willow Staff members at the bus stops, please remind your students to follow the school wide expectations as they are held accountable for their actions on the bus. The bus is an extension of school.

Thank you for your help in having your students get 9-12 hours of sleep each night, reviewing the bus expectations with them, walking your students to the bus stop, staying with them to supervise their behaviors, making sure they eat breakfast, and meeting them at the bus stop after school. We are confident that with the help of the adults in each home that ALL students can start their day brighter.
