

English Language Arts







This past week students were introduced to their new unit, **The Forces That Shape Us.** In this unit students are reading about adolescents and how internal and external forces shape their identity. New vocabulary was introduced and students have been practicing those words and will have a vocabulary test on Friday. Students are reading a short memoir next week, "Fish Cheeks", and working on the skill of character development.

7th Grade Unit 4: Community and Belonging

This week students began their new unit "Community and Belonging" and are focused on identifying what it means to be part of a community. Students are reading several informational texts and gathering evidence to define what it means to be part of a community. Students are also learning key terms and vocabulary that they will encounter in this unit and will be summatively assessed on these terms next week.

8th Grade Not That Different

Students started a new unit this week, "Not That Different". In this unit, students will analyze how an author develops mood, explain how a speaker's diction develops tone, and analyze the impact of character interactions and point of view on a text's meaning. This week they read "The Star Beast" by Nicholas Stuart Gray (a short story) and "What is Othering?" by Kendra Cherry (non-fiction). They were also introduced to new academic vocabulary, and they will be assessed on the vocabulary words next week.

What we're learning

Students will write fraction, decimal and percent equivalents to see different ways to represent percents. They will use estimation, benchmark percents and ratio strategies to solve percent problems, including determining the whole given the part and percent and determining the part of a whole.

Students will use inverse operations to fluently and efficiently solve two-step equations. They will use tables, graphs, verbal descriptions and scenarios to write and analyze two-step linear equations.

Students will analyze and solve systems of linear equations by graphing, through substitution and by inspection of the equations in the systems.

K-5 Art

Kindergarten: KL students are making Owl Babies! We read the book "Owl Babies" and used paint to "stamp" soft and fuzzy owls to show texture!

1st Grade: Students in 1T are working on a "Smart Cookie" project. We read the book "Smart Cookie", and painted paper plates to look like a cookie. We will collage paper to add frosting, sprinkles, and a face!

2nd Grade: Students in 2M are working on a project called "Cozy Burrowing Animals". We learned about animals that hibernate in winter. We painted snow and a cozy underground burrow. Next week we will make curled up animals to add to the burrow.

3rd Grade: Students in 3C are working on a project called "Color Wheel Lion". We drew a lion with a mane that will be a color wheel! Students will paint their color wheel, learning about primary colors and mixing their own secondary colors.

4th Grade: Students in 4B started a paper project inspired by contemporary artist Heather Galler. We drew a still life of flowers, will trace with thick lines, and will paint with neon colors!

5th grade: Students do not have art for this quarter rotation.











6-8th Art

Ms. Baricovich S.I. K-2 & 4th Grade Classes with ClearMath

Kindergarten-We are continuing Topic 5- Continuing our introduction to the addition and equal symbol, learning that stories can be told with numbers, taking away is subtraction, as well as learning the subtraction symbol.

1st Grade-We are finishing Topic 4-Exploring grouping by tens and ones through the use of connecting cubes, working with 2 digit numbers on the number line and locating multiples of 10, and adding and subtracting multiples of 10 with 2 digit numbers.

2nd Grade-We are continuing Topic 3-Understanding the base-10 system to add and subtract 2- and 3-digit numbers. Students are developing multiple strategies for adding and subtracting, including adding and subtracting multiples of 10.

4th Grade-We are finishing Topic 4-Modeling decimal quantities using base-10 blocks and 10-by-10 grids and recognizing the connection between decimals and fractions. We will begin Module 2 Topic 5 -Formulazing whole number addition and subtraction. Students extend their understanding of regrouping and place value to add multi-digit whole numbers.

Message from Nurse Drogosz

**IMPORTANT REMINDER

Common Illness & School Attendance Reminder

Students are expected to attend school every day. However, illnesses can be lengthy and sometimes difficult deciding whether or not to send your child to school. The following information may be helpful in making your decision. Please be sure and provide your current phone number and the available emergency contact information. If your child is going to be absent, please call our attendance line-(708)-467-3650. You must leave your child's name, the reason for the absence, the date of the absence and your name to verify that it was a parent/guardian that is verifying the absence.

Fever:

Any temperature greater than 100 degrees F is considered a fever. Child must be fever free for 24 hours without using fever-reducing medications (such as Tylenol, Motrin, Advil, etc.) in order to return to school. This applies even if the underlying cause of the fever is non-infectious, such as middle ear infections, bronchitis, urinary tract infections, etc. Children with a fever do not usually feel well enough to participate and attend school activities. It is recommended that they be given 24 hours to recover from the fever before returning to school. Please note that a child who exhibits symptoms of illness without a fever may be sent home if the nurse feels this is in the best interest of the child or the child's classmates (with compromised immune systems).

Colds:

Children with an upper respiratory infection without a fever may attend school if they feel well enough to do so. It is helpful in preventing the spread of illness if children learn to use tissues to cover sneezes and coughs, and wash hands after contact with the secretions.

Infections:

Any child who has been on antibiotic therapy for 24 hours is no longer considered infectious and may return to school. This includes infections of the eye, nose(green discharge), skin and strep infections. (Exception is pink eye, not all doctors treat this, so the doctor or nurse will decide if exclusion is necessary to protect others from being contaminated).

Diarrhea:

Children with diarrhea should remain home until they are symptom free for 24 hours. The only exception is if diarrhea is the result of a chronic condition, then a note from the doctor is needed indicating the diarrhea is not infectious.

Vomiting

A child who has vomited the evening before or in the morning before school should remain home for the day.

Rash:

If your child has a rash all over his body (bright red, raised, or itchy) or a rash in one or more areas that is draining fluid. The nurse will determine the next action to be taken.

Common Childhood Diseases

If a child has chicken pox, measles, or any other known treatable contagious disease, they must be kept home until they are no longer contagious. For most common childhood diseases, the period of contagion is known. Consult Nurse Drogosz.
