# 6th Grade The Forces That Shape Us

This past week 6th graders have been working on a continuation of a the excerpt from the memoir <u>The Circuit</u>, by Francisco. In addition to this, students have been reading "The Sword of Damocles," and practicing the skills of objective summary, theme, and how specific parts of the story contribute to the theme. They will continue to practice these same reading skills next week with the short story "The Eighteenth Camel." Then they will look at finding a UNIVERSAL THEME for both "The Sword of Damocles" and "The Eighteenth Camel." This review of reading and writing skills is in preparation for their IAR test that they will take after Spring Break.

## 7th Grade Fractured Fairy Tales

This week students are working on creating a fractured fairy tale as we work on using narrative elements in writing. Students are reading stories and learning to identify transition words, phrases, and clauses to convey sequence and signal shifts from one setting to another. Students will then apply these narrative elements to create their own fractured fairy tale. Students are also reviewing skills in preparation for their IAR test that they will take after Spring Break.

#### 8th Grade

Students will begin a novel study of Night, by Elie Wiesel. They will start with some background information on the author and some poetry to understand the mood and tone of the novel. Then we will dive into studying the characters and setting of Section 1, pages 3-22. Within Section 1 of the book, students will also focus on tracing the theme of delusion as well as the repetition of the title word, NIGHT. In addition, students will be reading an excerpt from 1984, by George Orwell and focusing on theme, objective summary, and how characters respond or change as the plot of a story advances. This review of reading and writing skills is in preparation for their IAR test that they will take after Spring Break.

4th Grade: Students do not have art for this Quarter rotation.



Kindergarten-We started Topic 8-Moving on a Number Path.
Students will use a number path to compare numbers and to add and subtract within 10.

1st Grade-We are continuing Topic 6. Students will compose 2 dimensional or 3 dimensional shapes to create new composite shapes. Students will order shapes by length, build and draw shapes with defining attributes.

2nd Grade-We began Topic 5-Addition and subtraction on a Number line. Students will extend their knowledge of measurement to discover that a ruler is a type of number line. Students will use a number line to solve addition and subtraction problems.

On International Women's Day 2024, we celebrate women's achievements, yet recognize the urgent need to accelerate gender equality and equal opportunity for all. Too many women are still held back and the cost of inaction is high. We need urgent action to accelerate gender equality. Equality of opportunity for all is a matter of fairness and justice. It is essential for development. Women and girls are often more vulnerable to poverty, crises, and climate change. Gender equality, and women's participation in decision making - in communities, businesses, workplaces, and households - is key to well-being and prosperity. The evidence is clear: removing gender barriers unlocks economic productivity, reduces poverty, and deepens social cohesion. Closing the gender gap in employment could raise long-term GDP per capita by nearly 20 percent on average across countries.

## Message from Nurse Drogosz

#### \*\*IMPORTANT REMINDER

#### **Common Illness & School Attendance Reminder**

Students are expected to attend school every day. However, illnesses can be lengthy and sometimes difficult deciding whether or not to send your child to school. The following information may be helpful in making your decision. Please be sure and provide your current phone number and the available emergency contact information. If your child is going to be absent, please call our attendance line-(708)-467-3650. You must leave your child's name, the reason for the absence, the date of the absence and your name to verify that it was a parent/guardian that is verifying the absence.

#### Fever:

Any temperature greater than 100 degrees F is considered a fever. Child must be fever free for 24 hours without using fever-reducing medications (such as Tylenol, Motrin, Advil, etc.) in order to return to school. This applies even if the underlying cause of the fever is non-infectious, such as middle ear infections, bronchitis, urinary tract infections, etc. Children with a fever do not usually feel well enough to participate and attend school activities. It is recommended that they be given 24 hours to recover from the fever before returning to school. Please note that a child who exhibits symptoms of illness without a fever may be sent home if the nurse feels this is in the best interest of the child or the child's classmates (with compromised immune systems).

#### Colds:

Children with an upper respiratory infection without a fever may attend school if they feel well enough to do so. It is helpful in preventing the spread of illness if children learn to use tissues to cover sneezes and coughs, and wash hands after contact with the secretions.

#### Infections:

Any child who has been on antibiotic therapy for 24 hours is no longer considered infectious and may return to school. This includes infections of the eye, nose(green discharge), skin and strep infections. (Exception is pink eye, not all doctors treat this, so the doctor or nurse will decide if exclusion is necessary to protect others from being contaminated).

#### Diarrhea:

Children with diarrhea should remain home until they are symptom free for 24 hours. The only exception is if diarrhea is the result of a chronic condition, then a note from the doctor is needed indicating the diarrhea is not infectious.

#### **Vomiting**

A child who has vomited the evening before or in the morning before school should remain home for the day.

#### Rash:

If your child has a rash all over his body (bright red, raised, or itchy) or a rash in one or more areas that is draining fluid. The nurse will determine the next action to be taken.

#### **Common Childhood Diseases**

If a child has chicken pox, measles, or any other known treatable contagious disease, they must be kept home until they are no longer contagious. For most common childhood diseases, the period of contagion is known. Consult Nurse Drogosz.
